Carine David is Professor of Public Law at the University of the French West Indies (Martinique). She specializes in French overseas territories, particularly the normative autonomy of overseas French communities and the political regimes of developing island states and territories. She is also working on environmental issues and climate change, as well as recently on the right to happiness. She is the editorial director of the Happiness Law Review (<http://www.oib-france.com/review-juridique-du-bonheur/>).

She has written some forty articles on political regimes on these different themes. She is the author of a book (*Essay on the legislative power of New Caledonia - The duality of the legislative source in a unitary state*, L'Harmattan, 2009). She has directed or co-directed several collective works (*Fifteen Years of legislative power in New Caledonia - On the Path of Maturity*, PUAM, 2017; *Sustainable Development in Oceania - Towards a New Ethics?*, PUAM and PUP, 2015; *The integration of custom into the development of the environmental standard*, Bruylant, 2012).

She is also a member of several other networks of researchers: the Global Network on Human Rights and Environment (GNHRE), the International Center for Comparative Environmental Law (CIDCE), the Pacific Islands Political Science Association (PIPSA) or the French Association of Constitutional Law (AFDC) and the Association of Jurists in the Law of Overseas Territories (AJDOM).
